May 22, 2026. Sheriff's Contract discussion with Captain Valenzuela.

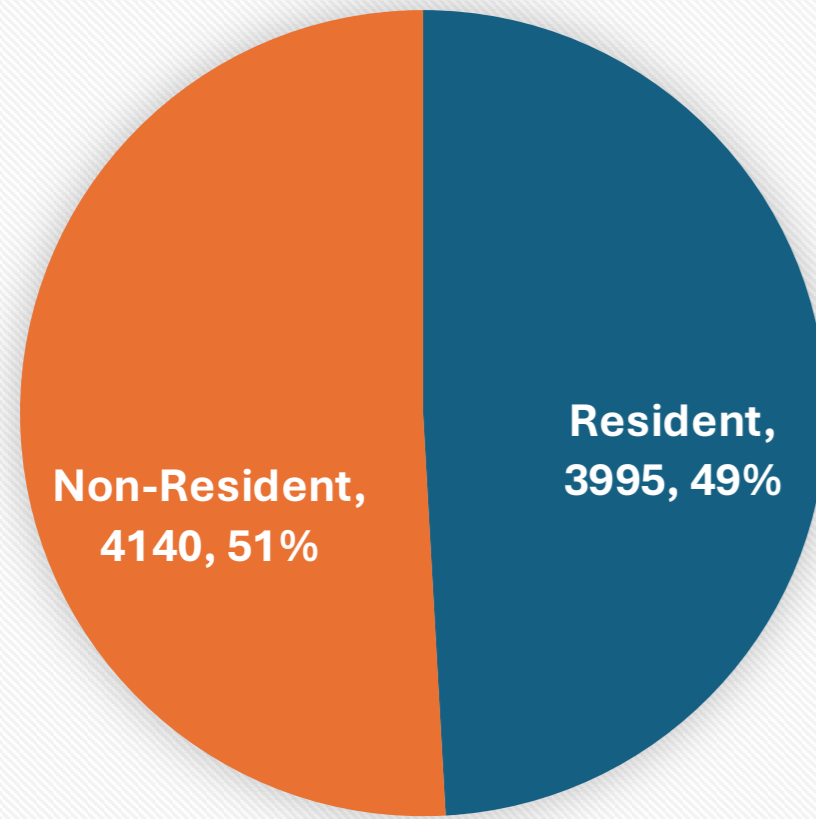

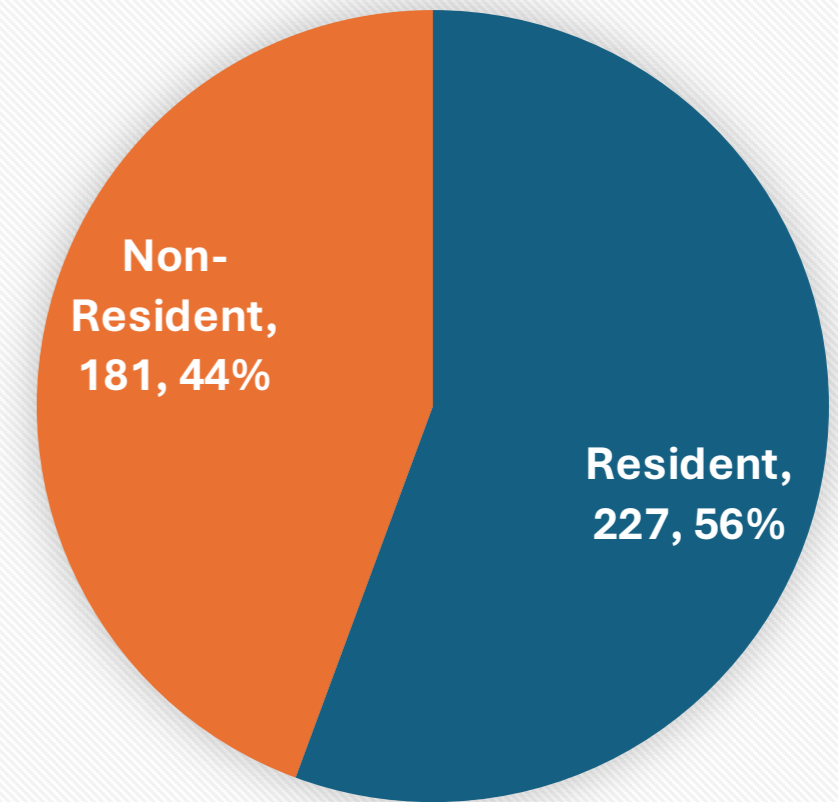

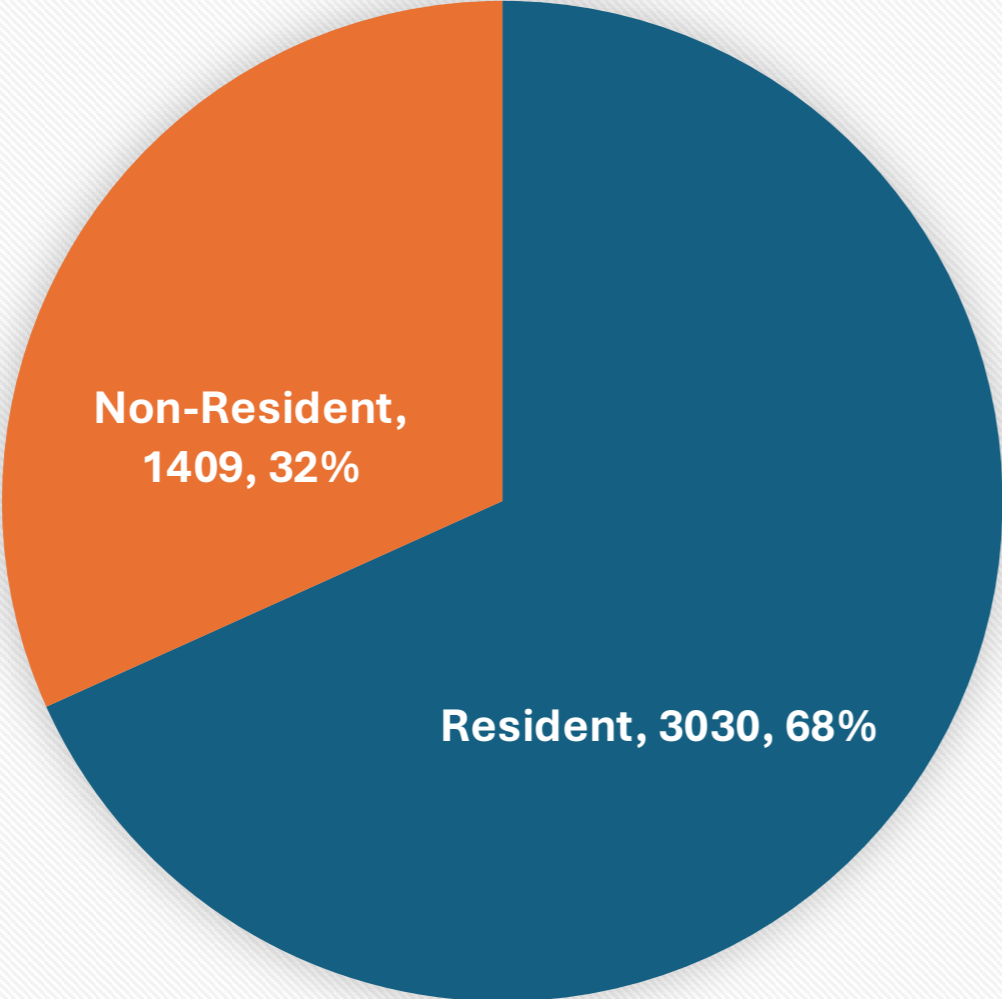

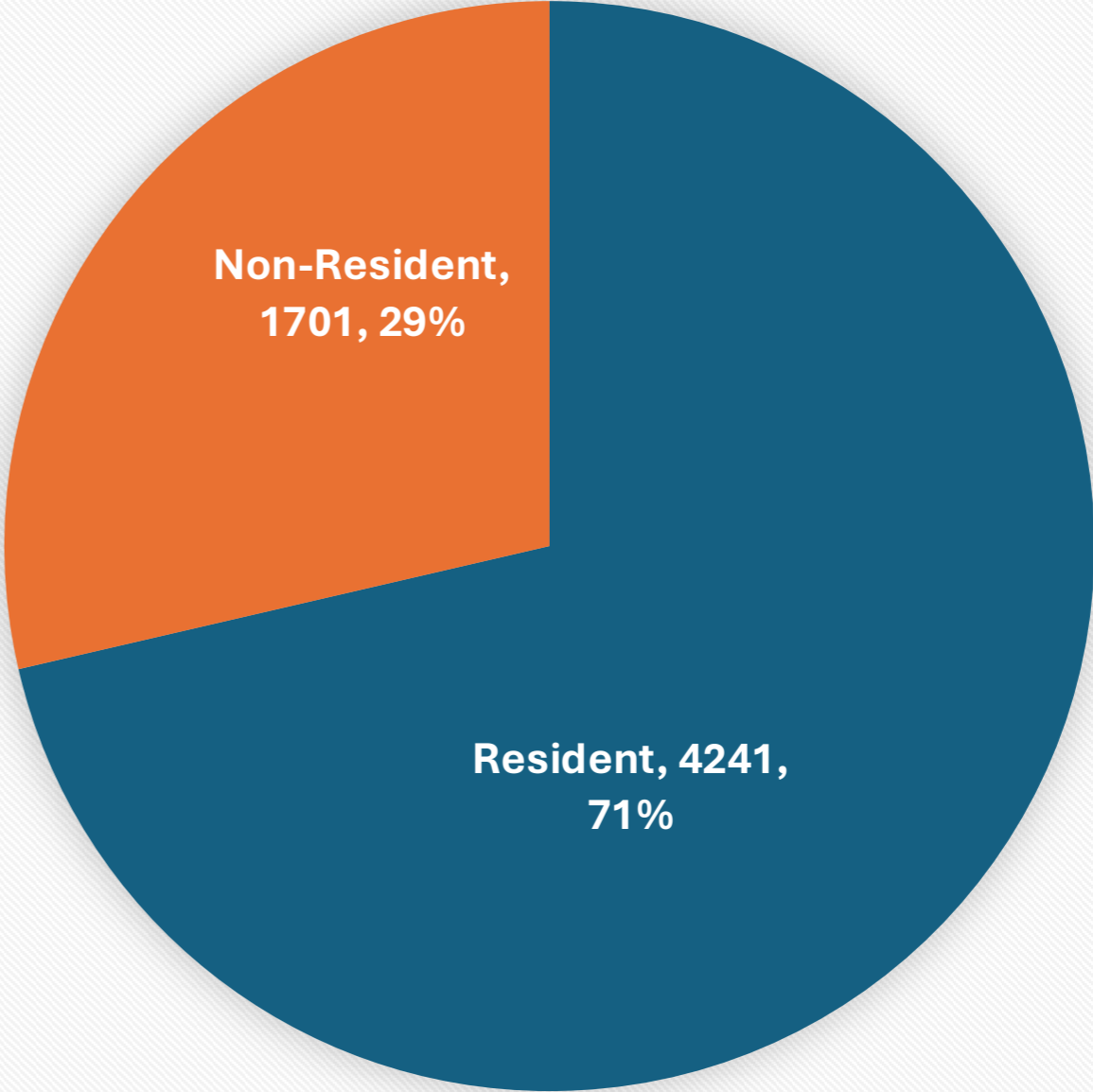

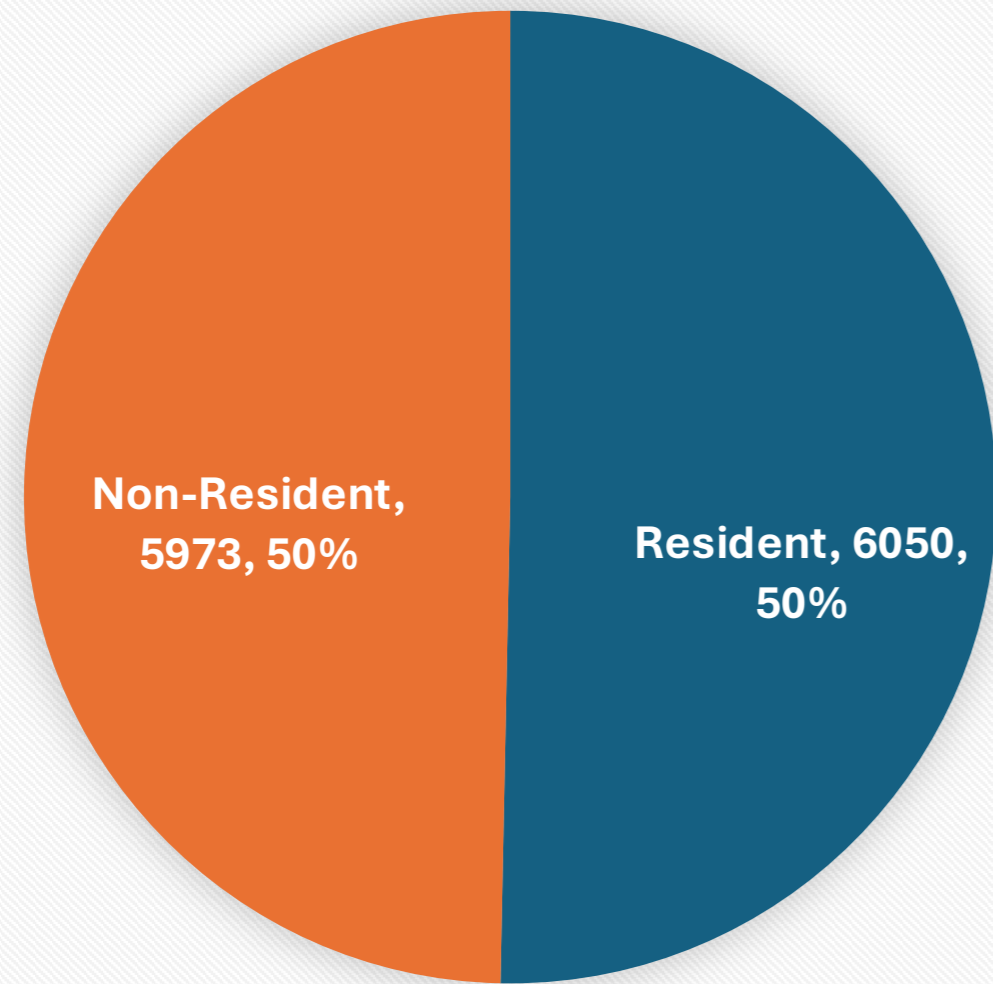

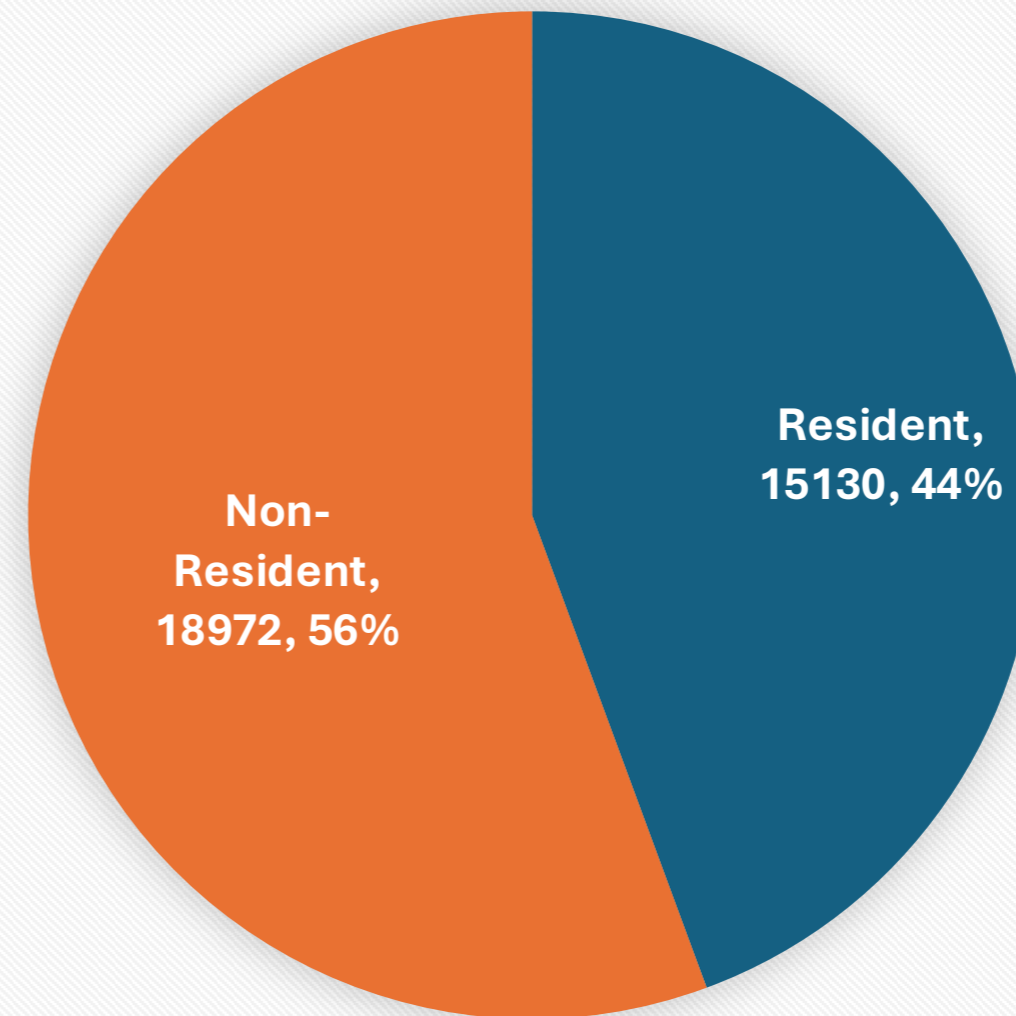

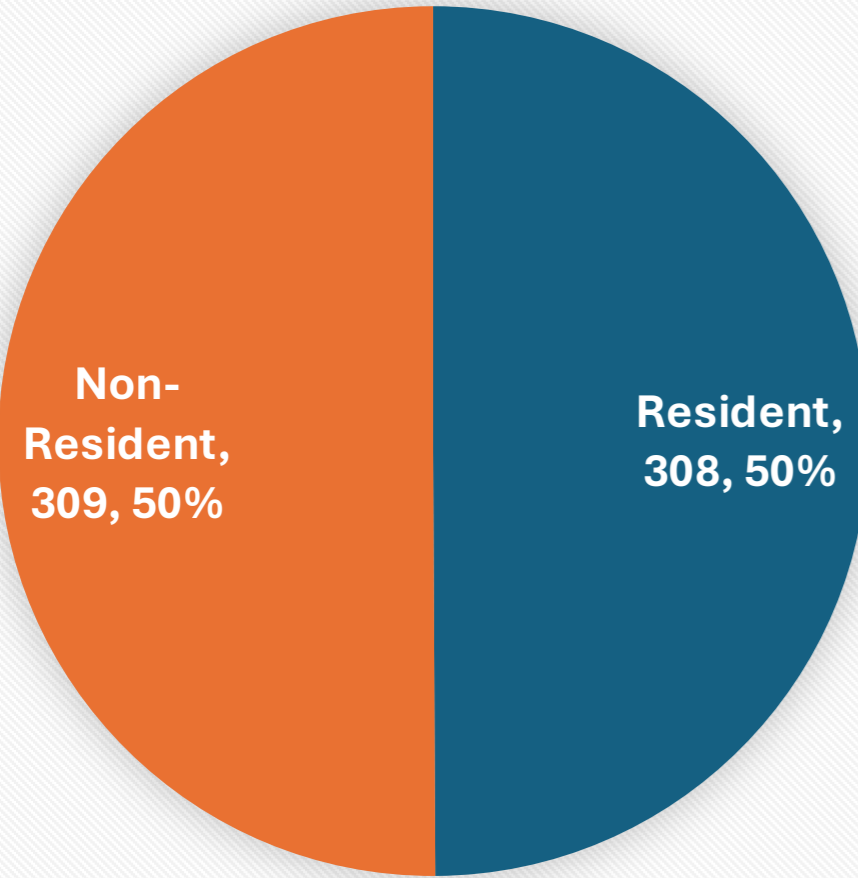

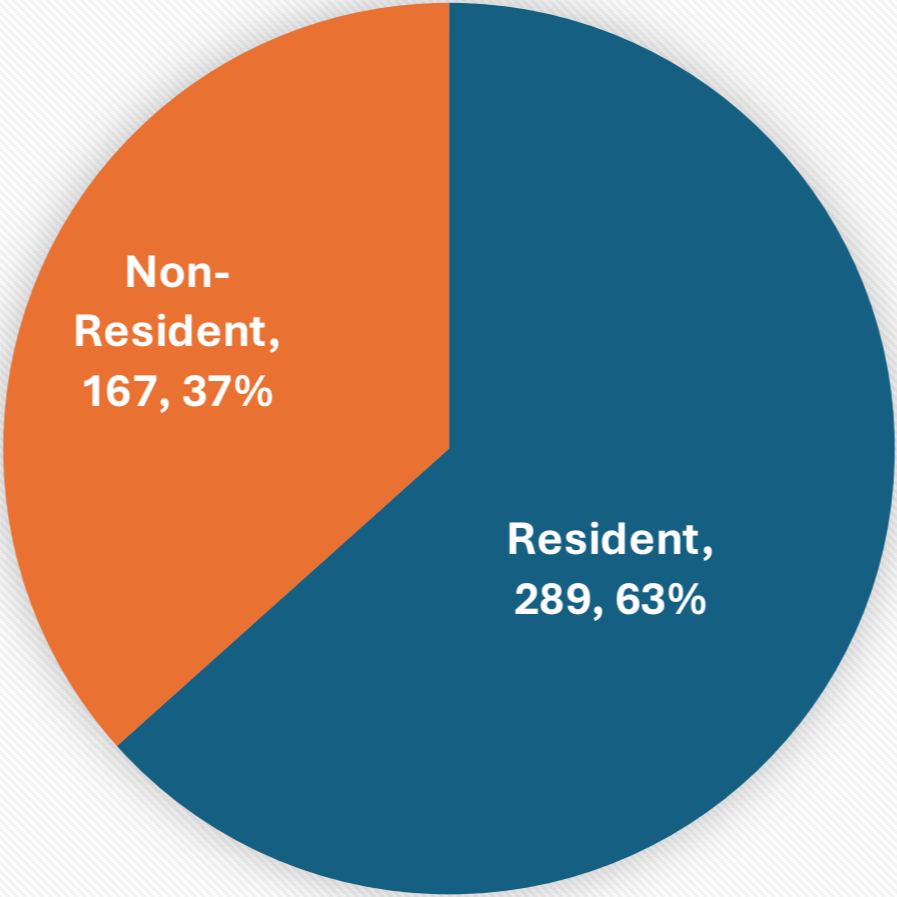

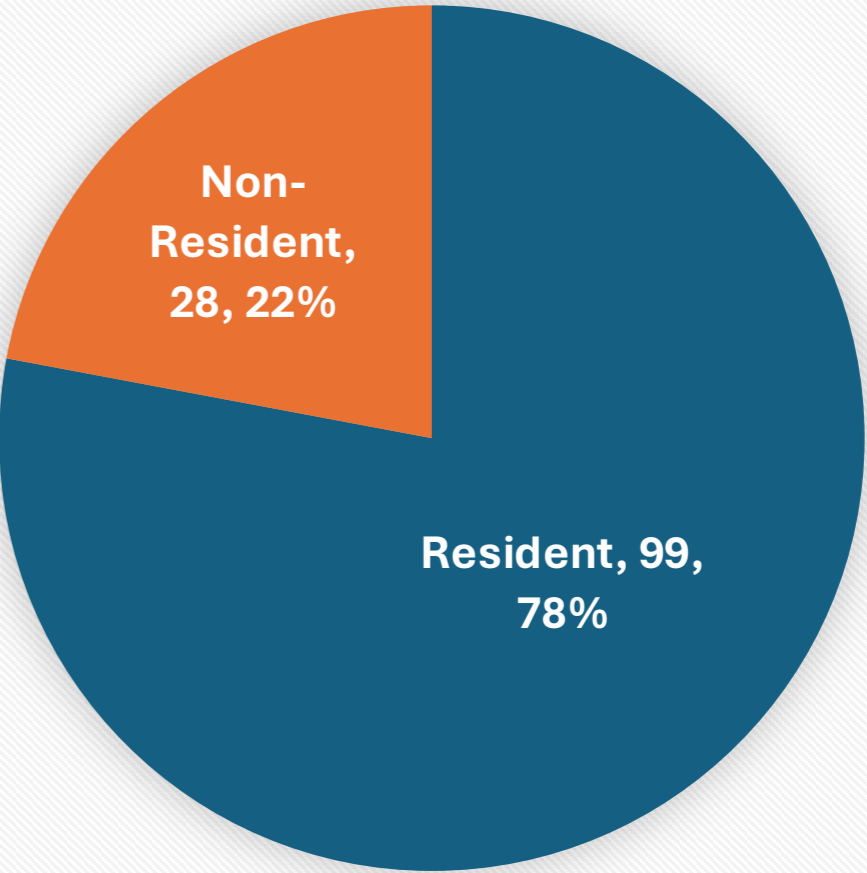

Effective July 1, 2026, staff will increase the non-resident differential to 25% department-wide, bringing rates more in line with neighboring agencies.

Laws and legal opinions for Parks and Rec Cost Recovery:

When setting fees specific to Parks and Recreation, fees do not need to be set at or under the cost of service, rather, fee amount(s) can and should be based upon the rates that the market can bear.

- Rental Rates are NOT subject to Prop 26 – can be based on features
- Recreation Program costs may be based on the options in the area

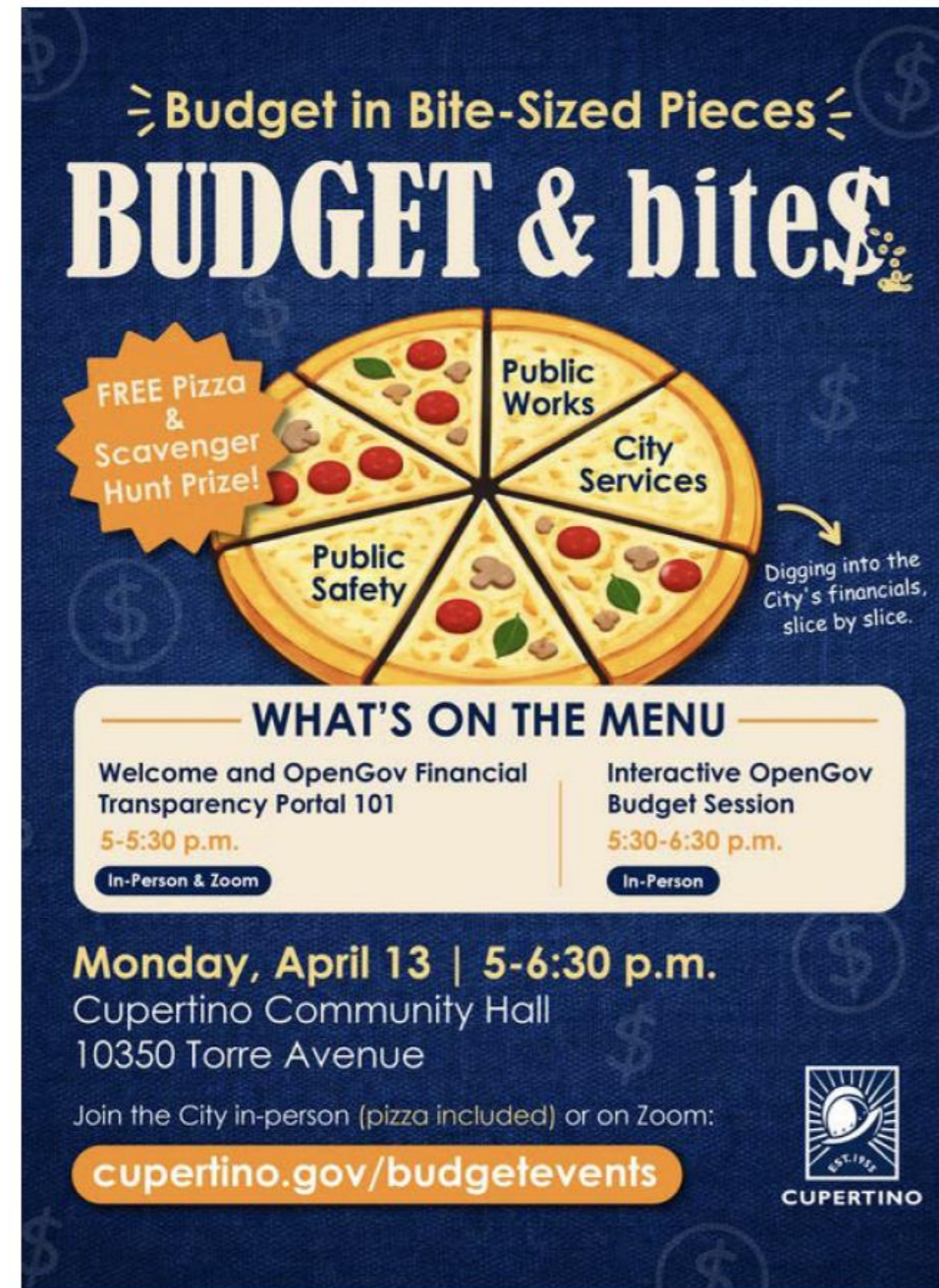
April 10-12: Hack Cupertino

MOTORIZED BICYCLE OR MOPED



CALIFORNIA VEHICLE CODE (CVC) 406(a) DEFINITION

- Two or three wheels
- Fully operative pedals or no pedals if it has an electric motor
- Maximum speed of 30 mph

RIDER REQUIREMENTS

LICENSE	DRIVER'S LICENSE WITH AN M1 OR M2 ENDORSEMENT
HELMET	DOT COMPLIANT HELMET REQUIRED FOR ALL
WHERE	May ride wherever traditional bicycles may ride - NO RIDING ON SIDEWALK CVC 21200
OTHER INFO	Must be registered and insured MUST BE 16 YEARS OR OLDER TO RIDE

POSSIBLE PENALTIES

- 12500(a) VC Citation - Driving without a license and tow with a 30-day impound
- Right of way violation

MOTORIZED E-SCOOTER



CALIFORNIA VEHICLE CODE (CVC) 407.5(a) DEFINITION

- Two wheels with a motor, handlebars, and a floorboard for standing on when riding
- May have a driver seat that does not interfere with the ability to stand and ride

RIDER REQUIREMENTS

LICENSE	DRIVER'S LICENSE OR INSTRUCTION PERMIT REQUIRED
HELMET	BICYCLE HELMET IF UNDER 18 CVC 21212
WHERE	May ride wherever traditional bicycles may ride - NO RIDING ON SIDEWALK CVC 21200
OTHER INFO	NOT TO EXCEED 15 MPH CVC 22411

POSSIBLE PENALTIES

- 12500(a) VC Citation - Driving without a license and tow with a 30-day impound

Safety First!

OFF-HIGHWAY MOTORCYCLE (DIRTBIKE)



CALIFORNIA VEHICLE CODE (CVC)
436/436.1 DEFINITION

- A motorcycle for use exclusively off the highway
- Electric and/or gas powered

CLASS 1 & CLASS 2 E-BIKES



CALIFORNIA VEHICLE CODE (CVC)
312.5(a)(1) / 312.5(a)(2) DEFINITION

- A pedal or throttle-assisted electric bicycle equipped with a motor that assists only up to a speed of 20 mph

CLASS 3 E-BIKE



CALIFORNIA VEHICLE CODE (CVC)
312.5(a)(3) DEFINITION

- A low-speed pedal-assisted electric bicycle equipped with a speedometer and a motor that provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and ceases to assist when a speed of 28 mph is reached

RIDER REQUIREMENTS

LICENSE	None. THIS TYPE OF MOTORCYCLE IS NOT STREET LEGAL
HELMET	DOT compliant helmet required
WHERE	Can only ride at off-highway vehicle parks or on private property MAY NOT RIDE ON ANY PUBLIC ROAD, SIDEWALK, OR PARK
OTHER INFO	Must be registered with the DMV and have vehicle insurance

RIDER REQUIREMENTS
