Fortunately, I arrived when they are closing up and I was able to get a tour of the bus and spoke to the Community Outreach Specialist who had worked for the Mobile Clinic Program for 6 years to understand how the program works and how it has evolved over time, from serving teens to unhoused to adding college students to the program.

**2026-05-06 attended the E-Bike & Youth Safety Community meeting, hosted by the Cupertino SR2S group**


- The session featured presentations from Bob Mittelstaedt ([E-Bike Access](#)) and Gwen Froh ([Marin Safe Routes to School](#)), covering current trends, legal considerations, and youth e-bike use in Bay Area schools.
- The Sheriff shared challenges they face when enforcing the rules on e-bikes and the difficulties to identify illegal e-bikes, which students should not ride. Gwen from the Marin County shared what they have tried and the no-trottle initiative they are promoting in schools.

These five individuals exemplify how leadership can empower the AAPI community across mental health, media, law and cultural preservation. Their work spans vital sectors, each uniquely advancing equity, cultural understanding and representation. These honorees remind us that community impact has no single path.




**Dr. Shashank Joshi**  
**Healer's Heart Award**  
 Dr. Joshi is widely recognized for championing mental health as a fundamental part of overall wellness. As the lead author of the K-12 Toolkit for Mental Health Promotion and Suicide Prevention, he has equipped countless youth and educators with the tools to prevent suicide clusters and respond with care in moments of crisis. His advocacy for programs such as allcove has helped provide safe, youth centered spaces where young people can seek support without stigma. His work continues to guide districts, clinicians and families toward practices that heal the quiet struggles in AAPI communities and beyond.




**John W. Kim**  
**Truth Seeker's Light Award**  
 John receives this honor in part for dismantling stereotypes and the "model minority" myths through complex storytelling in film. His recent film, Reunion, illuminates the ideas of identity and belonging with great nuance. By centering Asian American characters in genre films and intentionally avoiding tropes, he has expanded the boundaries of representation on screen.



**Paul Jhin**  
**Bridge of Justice Award**  
 This award honors Paul for a distinguished law career dedicated to undoing the wrongs of the past and guiding us toward a more inclusive future. From leading the Juvenile Justice Unit through major statewide reforms, to co-founding the National Asian Pacific Islander Prosecutors Association, to becoming the second Asian American appointed to the position of Assistant District Attorney in Santa Clara County's history, Paul consistently uses his voice to confront anti-Asian hate and strives to make justice accessible and culturally competent for everyone in our community.



**Connie Young Yu**  
**Guardian of Heritage Award**  
 Connie has played a vital role, as a historian and author, in helping communities from Utah to the San Francisco Bay Area understand a more intricate telling of their pasts and preserving histories that might otherwise be lost. As a cultural steward, Connie preserves our collective history for the benefit of future generations.



**Alysa Sakkas**  
**Guardian of Heritage Award**  
 Alysa brings the magic of Cupertino's connection to Japan to life, through the Cherry Blossom Festival, now 42 years strong. As President of the Cupertino-Toyokawa Sister Cities program and former president of the Cupertino Rotary Club, her work creates spaces where generations reconnect with their roots and others learn to appreciate the strong bonds built in people-to-people connection over those years, across the Pacific.
