September 25, 2023. Participated in the Public Policy Briefing: The Challenges of Addiction Medicine, hosted by Kaiser Permanente. Submitted questions. Presenters were from Kaiser Permanente and HealthRIGHT 360 which serves low income people specializing in treating substance use and co-occurring mental illness across California. They served 39,867 people last fiscal year. The HR360 continuum of care includes withdrawal management, residential, residential stepdown, to outpatient services. The problem with inter-county Medi-cal transfers was mentioned and the need to work on silos for better patient care. For those of us who know or have had loved ones perish from addiction, opioid addiction, and what is often called the slow suicide, this is a good resource. https://bhsd.sccgov.org/programs-services/substance-use-services

September 30, 2023. Participated in the superb Cupertino Bike Fest which had excellent attendance despite the early rain. I reviewed the bike rodeo which is a cool program to teach young riders road safety, visited many booths to learn about regional bike plans, waste management for city events, and had my bike helmet carefully adjusted. Having been an early adopter of the mountain bike in 1984 using my \$4/hour unofficially emancipated student income to save for a \$550 nubby-tired mountain bike which would propel me from work to school and to my dorm in my then home state of Vermont, I happily went on the 9-10 mile bike tour of several Cupertino Parks and trails including the Regnart Creek Trail to go over the new bridge at Wilson Park (which has pottery classes!) and past the new basketball court and community gardens, then past the new tot playground area at Creekside Park, and off to the Sterling Barnhart Park adjacent to our newest future park, which will be at the Lawrence-Mitty site, then up to the Portal Park, and off to Memorial Park which has had the ponds repurposed to usable turf for festivals and recreation use and has a plan underway for upgrades, and lastly to Jollyman Park which has an all-inclusive playground in the works, the return brought us past the McClellan Road protected bike lanes and back to the festival.
