Sarah Wang

Art is the way I make sense of who I am and where I come from. My goal as an artist is to transform personal memories and cultural inheritance into work that resonates with both private intimacy and shared human experience. Through each project, I try to weave together the threads of family, culture, and identity to form stories that are vulnerable, reflective, and enduring.

My education at The Harker School and Happy Valley Art Afterschool have given me a strong foundation in creative exploration. Courses such as Advanced Painting, Figure Drawing, Digital Art, Sculpture, and Technical Theater have taught me how to experiment across mediums and connect concept to craft. My work has been recognized with two Scholastic Art & Writing National Gold Medals, and I have participated in highly selective CSSSA visual art summer camp and national competitions that challenged me to grow both technically and conceptually.

Community involvement is central to my practice. I teach children art through Colorful Minds, design handmade holiday cards for seniors, and contribute to my school's Art Club by creating decorations and public art. For me, art is not only self-expression but also service—it is a way to create connection, comfort, and joy for others.

The three works I present here each represent different "threads" that bind me. In *Speechless*, I painted myself against a collage of newspaper clippings and media text, confronting how political narratives and societal expectations silence individual voices. The thread here is my attempt to reclaim space and identity, questioning how power and truth bind us collectively yet unequally.

Ancestors' Splendor, my mixed-media sculpture, is a deeply personal piece that pays tribute to Asian women who, across generations, carried cultural weight through silence and sacrifice. I stitched together brocade, jade, and porcelain—symbols of tradition—with wounds and distress that speak to resilience and endurance. The work reflects how cultural expectations bind me to my heritage, even as I grapple with its costs.

Finally, in *Childhood Memory Binds Us*, I depicted myself and my sister as children, sharing food at a dinner table. Here, threads of memory and family love intertwine. This piece is a reminder that despite fear, pain, and silence, it is these intimate bonds that nurture and sustain me.

Through painting and sculpture, I seek to translate personal memory into shared narratives. Whether through the heaviness of inherited cultural threads or the warmth of sibling bonds, my goal is to show how art can make visible the unseen ties that bind us all.

Artist Statement - Ashley Hein

As a young child, art was my safe space, a world I crafted for myself to escape and blunt the harshness of reality. However, coming back was always dismaying: when the bright, vibrant hues of imagination washed away, I found myself once again helpless in my own body, unable to find joy in being present. Growing older, I have finally learned to bridge that gap between the world of my art and the one I actually inhabit. While before it was a silent refuge, I learned to find a voice through my art. I now use my art to speak for the girl I once was, and other children in similar situations, namely those struggling with difficult home lives and mental illness.

However, art is also an intimate love letter I send to the world around me. My hands are only a conduit for the beauty I see, and I want my creations to express my gratitude for the little spots of hope in life. In my paintings, I aim to display that same mixture of childish joy and wonder alongside darker, more complex societal issues. While primarily painting in oil or acrylic, I like to incorporate supplies my younger self would have grabbed to doodle with, such as crayons and colored pencils. I am drawn to organic shapes and the freedom of unrestrained lines, echoing the gentle arcs and unpredictable contours that appear in foliage and nature. This practice allows me to honor and remember the pure excitement of my artistic beginnings. Often, these soft, flowing forms are set against denser, more detailed and gritty areas within a piece, creating a visual tension that reflects the duality of lightness and gravity at the heart of my work.

#3 Hema Kundargi My art journey began the same day the world stood still for COVID. With anxiety at an all-time high, I found myself grappling with fear for my family: my 80-year-old mother with asthma, alone in India, and my daughter completing her medical rotation at a hospital in New York. The combination of uncertainty and free time left me restless and overwhelmed. I decided to experiment with painting to calm my nerves.

My first attempt was an abstract painting of Ganesha, the Indian God believed to remove obstacles in life. The painting process felt like meditation; as I focused on the canvas, my mind stayed in the present, it did not wander into the future or past. My anxiety was harnessed into a creative outlet. I was happy with my art and posted it on social media. My neighbor loved it and requested me to make a similar piece. That simple connection marked the beginning of my art journey.

Since then, painting has brought calmness and energy into my soul. During the isolation phase of Covid, I've completed and shared over 100 pieces with friends, coworkers, neighbors, and family. I was touched by their comments; "Your aura comes through in the paintings of love and laughter" "The meditation painting reminds me that no matter what is going on in my life, I can find peace" "You inspired me to start painting again" "I will keep your Ganesha painting next to my Allah to bring peace in this world." These comments encouraged me to continue.

My work gained recognition when a local <u>Indian magazine</u> featured my story, and I was invited to participate in an art auction for the <u>Relief for Cancer Foundation</u>. To date, my paintings have raised more than \$5000 for charitable causes. Now I carve out time on every weekend for my art meditation and continue to explore different mediums of acrylics, oils, and charcoal. I've hosted painting events for coworkers and friends and introduced them to art meditation

As a self-taught artist, I am committed to learning and growing with two goals: Continue to paint and donate 100% of the sale proceeds for charitable causes and equally important to introduce and share art meditation to any one who is curious to learn.

My art journey has been a true win-win-win situation. Painting helps me relax; supports meaningful causes; share my passion for art meditation.



American-Born Chinese



I was rushing when I made this piece but I got the result I wanted by using digital art. The piece depicts a boy who is standing on a grassy hill almost submerged under the sea of green. He holds a camera that contains his nostalgic memories that he captured throughout his life in this Fruitiger Aero inspired setting. Fruitiger Aero is an aesthetic that is shown with an over-saturated background with an appealing view of greens and blues which includes bubbles, clouds, and mismatched shadows. As he holds his camera standing in this grassfield it almost feels like he has entered another world which brings us to my final piece, <u>Departure</u>. 

Personal Statement for 2025 Cupertino Emerging Artist Award Application

My name is Iris Zheng, and I am 16 years old. From a young age, I have found joy in expressing myself through various forms of art and crafts. Recently, I have particularly gravitated towards painting, exploring with traditional mediums like gouache and acrylic, and digitally through Procreate and its various light modes. Art has always provided me with a calming space, offering a break from my busy schedule. Throughout my art journey, I have primarily focused on creating aesthetically pleasing pieces, as that sense of beauty brought me a sense of satisfaction. However, more recently, I've been challenging myself to be more reflective—allowing my personal experiences to guide my work, even if the process isn't traditionally "beautiful."

I'm excited to submit three works for the Cupertino Emerging Artist Award. Two of them reflect my exploration of traditional and digital painting, while the third responds to the 2025 theme, "Threads that Bind Us."

As an emerging artist, I am excited to continue exploring various artistic styles and techniques in search of my niche. I am grateful for the opportunity to share my work and hope that my pieces will resonate with viewers in any way.



Once Upon A Time 9" x 15" Digital Art in Procreate 2025




