National Objectives

Must meet National Objectives

Community Engagement

- A county-wide effort collect local/regional data and trends.
- Twenty-two stakeholder interviews
- Four regional workshops, one in Cupertino.
- Seven agencies participated in focus groups
- Four pop-up events
- A community survey online and paper version at several City locations, four languages.

Needs Assessment

- The biggest housing problem in the City is Cost Burden (paying >30% toward housing)
- Hispanic, Asian, and Pacific Islander households are disproportionately affected by housing problems.
- There are 28 HCV holders in the City across the County voucher holders have a difficult time finding appropriate housing
- Homelessness in the City rose 25% from 2017 to 2019.
 - 127 to 159 unsheltered individuals

Housing Market Analysis

- Owner occupied, single family homes
- 2015 Median Home Value \$1,140,200 and rising - difficult for LMI households to buy
- 795 affordable housing unit gap LMI renters
- LMI homeowners need financial assistance to rehabilitate heath/safety issues
- Internet important to access education and job search activities. Public Wi-Fi at some locations; Xfinity/AT&T offer discounts to LMI
- No City offered emergency shelters or transitional housing for homeless persons.
- 943 residential care facility beds for the elderly
- The City works to prepare for disasters

Strategic Plan

- 2020-2025 Priority Needs
 - Affordable housing through both homeowner and rental unit rehabilitation
 - Preventing and assisting those experiencing homelessness
 - Providing community services for frail elderly/elderly persons
 - Promoting fair housing choice
