Mulch as well as compost for use in city

New regulations: SB1383: Short-Lived Climate Pollutants

- Goes into effect 1/1/2022
- Requires 75% reduction of organics in garbage by 2025 in California
- Businesses: Edible food to be "rescued"
- Everybody: Food scraps and food-soiled paper into the organics cart/bin





CORONAVIRUS RELIEF ACT Funding Framework







Six Expenditure Categories

- 2. Public Health Expenses
- 3. Substantially Dedicated Payroll Expenses
- 4. Comply with Public Health measures and Mitigate the Effects of COVID-19
- 5. Economic Support
- 6. Other

The City will allocate the \$735K CRF for Law Enforcement costs

providing relief to the General Fund

and is recommending additional allocations of the same amount for Covid-19 related expenses





Category 4: Complying with Public Health Measures \$211,000

such as homeless encampment, employee telework and senior meal delivery

In addition to the \$735K CRF allocation, the City will also receive funding through the

CARES Act - Community
Development Block Grant
(CDBG)

CDBG Funding: \$553,939

for Small Business Assistance
