




Project Description



#16 Lobbying Ordinance

Lobbying Ordinance

Background

- Requested by Mayor Paul and Vice Mayor Chao on November 2, 2020
- Lobbying Ordinances in Santa Clara County
 - City of Santa Clara
 - City of San Jose
 - Santa Clara County
 - City of Milpitas (limited to lobbying on behalf of the City)
 - City of Palo Alto (focused on cable television)

Proposed Ordinance

- Regulates lobbyists seeking to influence City decisions
 - Register and pay a registration and client fee
 - Disclose their identity and clients when lobbying a City official or at a City public meeting
 - File a report of lobbying activities with the City Clerk's Office twice a year

Lobbyists

- Includes: contract lobbyists, business/organization lobbyists, expenditure lobbyists
- Exemptions such as:
 - Public officials
 - Those in media/news (unless a contract lobbyist)
 - Those reimbursed only for reasonable travel, meals, and incidentals
 - Those only providing testimony at City public meetings (unless otherwise considered a lobbyist)
 - Recognized employee organizations
 - Nonprofits (unless compensation for the specific topic)
 - Business owners (subject to certain limitations)
 - Those solely providing "whistleblower" complaints

Registration

- Required registration and annual renewal
- Required disclosures
 - Contact and business information
 - Client information
 - Issues the lobbyist is seeking to influence
 - Payments received for lobbying services
- Fees/Fines
 - Registration and renewal fees
 - Client fee for each client in which compensation exceeds \$500
 - Late fine \$25/day

Reporting

- Reports due to City Clerk's Office by July 15 and January 15 each year
- Reporting requirements included:
 - Information required at registration
 - Any payments to lobbyists for services rendered to the City, City officials, City officials-elect or their controlled committees/ballot measure committees
- Other options:
 - Payments made by lobbyists
 - Lobbyist campaign contributions
 - Lobbyist donations made on behalf of City officials

Implementation & Enforcement

- Operative July 1, 2021
 - Development of the registration and report submittal process
 - Analysis to determine appropriate fees for adoption at the annual fee schedule update in April
 - Inclusion in the City's records retention schedule
- Enforcement: General Penalty provisions
- Lessons learned from other cities
 - Ongoing ~100 staff hours/yr with more for set up
 - Enforcement is challenging
 - Facilitating lobbyist identification at teleconference meetings can be challenging

Recommended Action

Conduct the first reading of Ordinance No. 21-2222:
 "An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of
 Cupertino Adding Chapter 2.100 ("Regulation of
 Lobbying Activities") to Title 2 ("Administration and
 Personnel") of the Cupertino Municipal Code," which
 includes a finding that adoption of the ordinance is
 exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act.

2021 Legislative Platform

February 2, 2021



Background

- Legislative Platform approved annually
- Guides and informs official City positions on pending legislative issues during the year
- Authorizes Legislative Review Committee (LRC) to take City positions on bills based on the Council-approved Platform
- If a bill falls outside of the Legislative Platform, a City position can only be taken by the full Council

2021 Legislative Platform

- LRC reviewed draft platform on Jan 8 and recommended for Council adoption
- Notable changes include:
 - New section on homelessness
 - Support for allowing remote or video conference public meetings
 - Support for preservation of natural resources, organic waste recycling, and landfill diversion
 - Monitor square footage-based parcel taxes

Recommended Action

 Adopt the proposed 2021 Legislative Platform.
