

Record Low Unemployment Rate

According to an analysis by Joint Venture Silicon Valley's Institute for Regional Studies, the unemployment rate in the Silicon Valley region has dipped to 1.8% in May, representing the lowest rate of unemployment in three decades. Silicon Valley employers increased their workforce by just over 1,100 employees between mid-April and mid-May, while the labor force declined by approximately 2,700 individuals in the same time frame. The total labor force in the region is nearly 45,000

Background

- On July 6, 1992 original tenant agreement
 - Renewed in 1994 and 1996
- 2015-2021 Cupertino Historical Society awarded Community Funding Grants/Budget line item funding

Historical Funding

- Community Funding Grant Program:
 - 2015 \$10,000
 - 2016 \$15,000
 - 2017 \$15,000
 - 2018 \$15,000
 - 2019 \$20,000 (individual budget line item)
 - 2020 \$20,000 (individual budget line item)
 - 2021 \$20,000 (one time allocation)

Council Subcommittee

- On June 4, 2021, Council Subcommittee formed
 - Councilmember Moore
 - Councilmember Wei
- March 8, 2022 subcommittee meeting and request for:
 - Comparative Analysis of other SCC Historical Societies
 - Historical Funding Report
 - Proposed use of future funding
 - Clarification on budget-line item versus Community Funding process

Update to Council

- On June 21, 2022, Council received update on the research requested by subcommittee and directed staff to
 - Bring back an annual agreement for facility use of the Quinlan Museum space and meeting spaces in Quinlan
 - Bring back an agreement or MOU to clarify services that Historical Society will provide and processes to ensure transparency
 - Potential annual budget amount: \$20,000 -\$40,000
 - Consideration of other items outlined by Council

Council Consideration

- City of Cupertino Grant Funding and License Agreement (Attachment D)
 - Includes Exhibit A License Area
 - Includes Exhibit B Grant Project
- Agreement has been reviewed and agreed to by the Historical Society

Agreement Details

- Term is set for three years
 - A possible two-year extension with a total of five years
- Will receive funding in the amount of \$40,000 in each of the first three years
 - If agreement terms are met in the first three years, the agreement would be extended up to two more years, with each year awarding \$40,000 in funding

Additional Contract Terms

- Semi-annual update and annual report to the Parks and Recreation Commission
 - Including Cupertino Historical Society's annual work plan
- Position on the Cupertino Historical Society's Advisory Council designated for a Council member
- Commitment to engage in fundraising opportunities

Additional Terms

- City's ability to provide staff oversight and direction would be limited
- Historical Society is permitted to apply for a Community Funding Grant under the terms of the Community Funding Grant Policy.

Fiscal Impact

- Amendment in the budget for the current FY 2022-23
- If \$40,000 funding is approved:
 - Historical Society Budget Staff will add \$20,000 to the Historical Society budget and transfer \$20,000 from the contract line item in Community Funding budget
 - The new budget will appear in the FY23-24 budget and include a budget narrative describing use of these funds



Climate Victory Gardens Objectives

- Create a program to help residents choose water-wise turf conversion (concierge service)
- Leverage rebates from Valley Water



One Million Sq. Ft. of Turf Converted In the Fiscal Year 2021-22, Valley Water converted over one million square feet of turf through our landscape

rebate program.



Water Use Dropped 25% in the Last 5 Years Water use was 148 gallons per person per day in 2017 and 111 gallons per person per day in 2022.



22 Water Conservation Programs Underway Valley Water offers 16 programs for outdoor conservation and 6 programs for indoor conservation, for residents, businesses, and farms.




On Track for Long-Term Water Savings

Valley Water is on track to save 99,000 acre-feet per year by 2030 compared to 1992 and 109,000 acre-feet by 2040.



Climate Victory Gardens Timeline




2021: 18 projects completed; 25,356 total landscape converted area

2022: 10 projects in progress; 9,739 total landscape converted area



Eligibility Criteria:

- Home, multifamily property, nonprofit
- Front/side turf yard visible to the general public in the City of Cupertino
- Minimum 500 square feet



Additional Project Installation Elements



Rain Garden: \$2.00/sq. ft. (up to \$600) rebate

Laundry to Landscape: \$200-\$400 rebate

Rainwater Harvesting: up to \$70 rebate





Challenges and Responses to Victory Gardens

Challenges	Response
Contractor Availability	 ✓ Increased customer payment commitment
Uneven amount of staff time	\checkmark Selective intake to the pilot
 Drop-outs are costly 	 Consider adding a deposit payment requirement
 Planning/review fees for some larger sites 	 Asked City Council to waive planning fees
Cost to serve small sites is high	 Consider focusing on commercial/institutional sites

Recommended Next Steps

Provide feedback to staff and:

- (1) Continue to share these findings with neighboring jurisdictions, Valley Water, and to develop further partnerships with landscape supply companies, designers, and installers through the life of the pilot program, and
- (2) Focus on large and institutional sites based on the evidence provided by the cost effectiveness table (Table 3), and
- (3) Explore partnerships for training and workforce development to ensure that the customer, the City, and contractor can move projects forward in a timely manner, and
- (4) Bring back a permanent program for City Council's consideration before the pilot program expires in 2023.

State Law AB 1236 & AB 970 Requirements

- 1. Streamlining Ordinance for Expedited EVCS Permit Process
- 2. Permitting Checklists Online for L2 & DCFC
- 3. Administrative Approval of EVCS
- 4. Approval Limited to Health & Safety Review
- 5. Electronic Signatures Accepted
- 6. EVCS Not Subject to Association Approval
- 7. One Complete Deficiency Notice if Application is Incomplete

1. Streamlining Ordinance for Expedited EVCS Permit Process

"Ordinance creating an expedited, streamlined permitting process for electric vehicle charging stations (EVCS) including level 2 and direct current fast chargers (DCFC) has been adopted."

2. Permitting Checklists Online for L2 & DCFC

"Checklist of all requirements needed for expedited review posted on city [or county] website."

3. Administrative Approval of EVCS

"EVCS projects that meet expedited checklist are administratively approved through building or similar nondiscretionary permit."

Complete if:

"The streamlining ordinance states that permit applications that meet checklist requirements will be approved through non-discretionary permit (or similar)."

4. Permit Application Review Limited to Health& Safety

"EVCS project review limited to health and safety requirements found under local, state, and federal law."

Complete if:

"The streamlining ordinance states that no discretionary use permit is required and permit approval will be limited to health and safety review."

5. Electronic Signatures Accepted

"Authority Having Jurisdiction (AHJ) accepts electronic signatures on permit applications.*

*If a city [or county] determines it is unable to accept electronic signatures on all forms, the permit streamlining ordinance shall state the reasons."

Complete if:

"Electronic signatures accepted on City [or County] website (usually specified in the ordinance)."

6. EVCS Not Subject to Association Approval

"EVCS permit approval not subject to approval of an association (as defined in Section 4080 of the Civil Code)."

Complete if:

"The streamlining ordinance states that EVCS permits do not require association approval."


7. One Complete Deficiency Notice if Application is Incomplete

"AHJ commits to issuing one complete written correction notice detailing all deficiencies in an incomplete application and any additional information needed to be eligible for expedited permit issuance."

Complete if:

"The streamlining ordinance dictates that a written correction notices must detail all deficiencies."

EVCS Permit Process and Timeline




* The deficiency notice should include one complete set of comments.
