Over the past year I have seen a real need for a few benches at Jollyman. We are there for a little over an hour. In the winter, right after sunset, it is very dark. I think I lost 10 balls after hours and we all have to put light collars on our dogs to be able to see them well. I understand that lights back there might be an issue to residents living up against the fence and running electricity would be pretty expensive. I am suggesting Dog Park Solar Lighting. They are much cheaper.

It is not just a luxury, I believe it is also a safety issue. We cannot tell who is approaching in the dark.

A resident told me that the city purchased that property a few years ago.




