GENERAL PLAN ADMINISTRATION AND IMPLEMENTATION

If the City's General Plan is to serve its purpose effectively, it must be reviewed, maintained, and implemented in a systematic and consistent manner. Implementation of the General Plan will occur through participation by a number of parties including residents, elected and appointed City officials, City staff, and City partners (e.g., Santa Clara County Sheriff and Fire). This document provides direction on how the City will implement and maintain the General Plan and sets out specific actions the City will undertake to achieve the goals and policies of the General Plan.

It includes a summary of implementation programs for the General Plan followed by tables that list specific implementation programs, organized by the topics addressed in the General Plan Elements.

Specific Implementation Programs

Specific implementation programs are listed in the following tables. Each implementation program is a description of which policy(ies) the program implements, which City department(s) is responsible for implementation, and which department(s) will support the responsible department(s).

Each program also identifies a potential funding source for the program. This is intended only to inform the City budgeting process. It does not commit funding to a program for a given timeframe. The City will determine as part of the annual budget process which programs will be funded based on available City resources and needs. Finally, to the right of each program is a timeline that identifies when the implementation will becompleted.
